Program Summary

This presentation will take an in depth look at the Public Safety Assessment (PSA), the risk assessment tool currently being utilized by police, prosecutors, and the courts to frame decision-making in Bail Reform. In addition, the seminar will include an analysis of the Ontario Domestic Assault Risk Assessment (ODARA), which was recently designated as the risk assessment tool for utilization by law enforcement statewide in certain domestic violence incidents and will be deployed on November 1, 2017. Items to be discussed will include the research behind the tools, specific risk factors addressed, and scoring methodologies. The presenters, AAG Geoffrey Soriano and DAG Joseph Walsh, have been deeply involved with the drafting of Attorney General Directive 2016-6 (Establishing Interim Policies, Practices, and Procedures to Implement Criminal Justice Reform Pursuant to P.L. 2014, c. 31) as well as the recent modifications to this Directive.

Who Should Attend?

This program is mandatory for all Division of Criminal Justice Deputy Attorneys General hired after January 1, 2015. The Division of Criminal Justice has notified those attorneys who are required to attend this program. Other attorneys within the Department of Law and Public Safety are welcome to attend; space permitting. Please do not attempt to register for this program if you

are not an attorney in the Department of Law and Public Safety.

Who Is the Faculty?

Geoffrey D. Soriano is an Assistant Attorney General in the Division of Criminal Justice. Mr. Soriano is a 1986 graduate of Brown University, majoring in Political Science and Organizational Behavior and Management. He earned his juris doctorate degree, cum laude, from the Seton Hall University School of Law in 1989. Following his formal education, Mr. Soriano clerked for the Honorable Wilfred P. Diana during the 1989-1990 court term. A private practitioner for 20 years with 18 years of experience as a municipal court prosecutor, Mr. Soriano served as the County Prosecutor for Somerset County from October 21, 2010 to March 7, 2016. During his time with the Division of Criminal Justice, Mr. Soriano's responsibilities have primarily focused upon the myriad of issues associated with Criminal Justice Reform.

Joseph F. Walsh is a Deputy Attorney General assigned to the Prosecutors Supervision and Training Bureau of the New Jersey Division of Criminal Justice. Mr. Walsh is a 1983 graduate of Drexel University, earning his undergraduate degree in Business Administration-Accounting. He next graduated from the Rutgers University School of Law-Camden in 1986, earning his Juris Doctorate with high honors. Mr. Walsh is a graduate of the Burlington County Police Academy and a Police Training Commission Certified Instructor.

Prior to joining the Division of Criminal Justice, Joseph Walsh served as a police officer in Moorestown Township, retiring in 2015 as a Sergeant. He was assigned for sixteen years as a supervisor in both the Patrol Division and the Detective Bureau. He has also served as an Assistant County Prosecutor in both Camden County and Burlington County.

As a Deputy Attorney General assigned to the Prosecutors Supervision and Training Bureau, Mr. Walsh assists with the coordination of the twenty-one County Prosecutor's Offices, as well as with law enforcement training statewide. Recently, the Bureau has been working on numerous projects, including Body Worn Cameras (BWCs), Conducted Energy Devices (CEDs), Training for Law Enforcement Officers in Dealing with Mentally Ill Individuals, and Criminal Justice Reform. Mr. Walsh is presently serving as the Acting Administrator of the New Jersey Police Training Commission.

Non-State Employees or State Employees not Connected to the Garden State Network

If you are not a State employee, or are otherwise unable to access the AGAI Course Registration System through the Garden State Network, kindly email the Advocacy Institute at: njagai@njoag.gov for an authorization code to allow you access to the AGAI Course Registration System through the My New Jersey portal. **Setting up your account through the portal is a two-step process, the details of which are set forth in the next two paragraphs.**

Once you receive the portal authorization code you will be prompted to go to the My New Jersey portal at <http://www.state.nj.us/> and create a portal account. Once your portal account is created you are prompted to enter your authorization code. This is Step 1 of the process, which you need only do once.

If you have already been issued an authorization code in the past you do not need to request another one. You can log into your account on the Garden State Network at <http://www.state.nj.us> and under the heading NJ L&PS Applications you will see the Attorney General's Advocacy Institute's Registration System. Click on that and log into your account on our system.
